2-X1 goals for this year, is to recruit 330 new members with the drops limited to 280 for a net membership increase of 50. These are achievable goals We have a good start with a net growth of 23 for the first month. Let us keep the positive momentum going. As we learnt from last year, the key to growth is member retention. All clubs are urged to have a retention strategy. If you are losing members after less than three years of becoming a Lion, focus on proper induction, new member orientation, assign a mentor, keep them engaged and flexible meeting. For senior members increase their responsibilities, both in club and the district.

GMA focus this year will be on clubs, so they will embrace the GMA process. The 4 step process is simple. I have developed a one page form that can be used to do the process, which should not take more than 1-2 hours. I will pass these on to zone chairs, so they can pass these to club presidents. Please use this useful tool, to better understand your club and how to recruit and retain new members.

Service: In the first month 2-X1 has served over 21,088 people with 138 service activities

Leadership Training: Club officers training was already held in June, including Zone Chairs and LCIF.

I missed our first cabinet meeting since I was a guest speaker at 2-T3 cabinet meeting on the same day.

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LCIF FOUNDATION UPDATE

CONGRATULATIONS to IPDG Fred Conger for very good LCIF year. As of this writing, District 2X1, along with 36 clubs and 34 individuals, has donated a little over **\$62,000** to LCIF. The mission of LCIF is to strengthen and support the services and capabilities of Lions clubs and districts. District 2X1 has received approximately **\$100,000** in grants from LCIF in the 2022-2023 Lion year. The two most significant grants are:

- \$21,825 for the build-a-bed project championed by PDG's John Landrum and John Eads. This project was in conjunction with Sleep in Heavenly Peace to build 350 beds for children without beds to sleep in. 175 of those beds have been built and delivered to the Texas Lions Camp in time for this year's campers. The next build date will be on September 9, 2023 in Waxahachie. More details will be forthcoming.
- \$75,000 for Mabank Lions Club to provide the "Faith at Work Ministries" with a new refrigerated truck to assist them with their weekly food distribution.

As you can see, we get back more that we receive, and that allows us to take on much larger projects within our communities.

WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE? LCIF is transitioning to a Sustained Giving Program which will include a legacy giving program called "Your Lions Legacy". Contact me for more information.

Our district goal, in general is to increase individual and club giving and to have more clubs with 100% individual contributions. The exact goals are currently being finalized and will be presented in the cabinet meeting this month.





If you are submitting the 2022-2023 Club Excellence Award application to me (available on the district's web site lionsdistrict2x1.org) you need to have had your President, Secretary and Treasurer attend Lion Officer Training at either Lions University in June 2022, Mid-Winter Conference in Jan. 2023, or have completed the LCI respective officer training on the LEARN application or reviewed the appropriate officer position e-book information and notified me of that fact. Also, your club or an individual in your club must have contributed to Lions Clubs International's Foundation for the Lion year. You are automatically disqualified from LCI's Club Excellence award without a contribution no matter how small or large.

Clubs don't forget to report your meetings, fundraiser events, service projects and donations on MyLION each month. Fifty-four of our clubs (88.5%) reported something on MyLION in 2022-2023. We had the best percentage of the 16 districts in Texas. But EVERY club should report something in all four categories unless they are totally inactive. If you don't know how, CALL ME!

As I stated last month, the major reason we lose members is that we don't keep in touch with them and do not build **RELATIONSHIPS** among our members. Relationships are the number one of the top 10 motivators as to why people join and stay with an organization. Without that personal friendly connection and the feeling of belonging, members drift away. "The lesson here is to keep your club members involved and having fun together doing service and activities that they enjoy." Make sure your Lions know each other and become a Lion family of friends. In other words, Mentor your Lions, old and new.

Don't let members be forgotten if they start to miss club events. Personally contact them and make sure they feel needed and know that they are an important part of your club.

Club leaders, lead your clubs and keep your members happy with service, fun social events, interesting programs, and Lion family comradery. It is your responsibility to grow your club's membership, develop new club leaders, grow your service to your community, and support your Association and International Foundation.

The new and improved member interface application "Lion Portal" will be operational shortly. All clubs should update and verify their members and club information on MyLCI. The new Portal should make access to club and member information simpler to obtain and easier to maintain. All Lions will find this new portal useful where the current applications are focused on assisting club and district officers. In addition, all club officers and Lions are being asked to have a unique email address so LCI can provide information tailored to every Lion's position. Sharing email addresses for multiple club positions will be a problem.

JULIEN C. HYER LIONS YOUTH CAMP

"from the beginning as I remember"

The Julien C. Hyer Lions Youth Camp was the brain child of PDG Surry Shaffer, Jr., District 2-X1, founder of the Camp. As I recall, in late summer of 1973 a few of us Lions were asked to join Surry at his house on Byrn Marr in Dallas to discuss the formation of the Camp. Those Lions were F. Hall Brown, David Fagg, a non-Lion Jay Seaborn, a close business friend of Surry's who helped us with insurance on the Camp, John Hall, Otis Pharr and John Eads. There may have been others present, but the memory has faded.

I do remember distinctly that the meeting was around 4 p.m. on a Sunday afternoon and it lasted forever (always did if Surry was around). Before the evening was over, we had basically formed the Camp. David Fagg, an attorney, was to complete the application into the Secretary of State of Texas to form the non-profit entity with the bylaws to follow. The entity was formed on April 22, 1974 after many planning sessions. The Camp was patterned after the Youth Exchange Program of Lions Clubs International, except our Camp would take campers sponsored from Lions Clubs and not be required to send one of our youth back to the sponsoring Lions Club in their geographical area. As agreed at the meeting, Surry was going to be the first President of the Camp, F. Hall Brown, Secretary, and yours truly, Treasurer. At that time, other officer positions had not been solidified. Sometime later in early 1974, the respective Governors of both Districts, Odis Pharr 2-X1 and Albert Brown, 2-E2 became Vice-Presidents.

PDG Surry Shaffer, Jr. was responsible for this whole idea of having a youth camp. He garnered the idea from being one of the most influential Lions in the success of the Youth Exchange Program for Lions Clubs International. He had been Youth Exchange Chairman for District 2-X1 and MD-2 for many years and pretty much ran the program for LCI. During this time he was able to create and maintain many international relationships from Lions all over the world that were involved in the youth exchange program. These contacts later became instrumental Lions in the successes enjoyed by the Camp by providing youth sponsored by Lions Clubs from their geographical area

How did we obtain the name "Julien C. Hyer Lions Youth Camp?" I had been told many times by Surry that he tricked the Judge (Judge Julien C. Hyer, President of LCI 1931-32 and founder of Lions Clubs International Youth Exchange Program). He had many meetings about the Camp idea with Judge Hyer. The Judge supported the idea, but when Surry suggested it be named after him, he was not for it. Finally, Surry got up enough courage to tell him it had already been done. The name would be the Julien C. Hyer Lions Youth Camp. Surry told me that he wanted to honor his friend and that in recognition of his love and respect for the Judge and the principles he stood for, he named the Camp after him in spite of the Judge's request that he not do so. Surry told me later that even though it was hard for the Judge to forgive him for his "trickery," he was proud and honored to be a part of the Camp.

When we first set up the Camp, we had not involved any other Lions that were not volunteers from District 2-X1. However, at the first camping session Lions from District 2-E2 volunteered to assist us since they were from the geographical area around the Methodist Church camping area. I give a lot of credit to Bill Hudson for getting them involved. They were close to the action and their volunteer coordinator was PDG Earl Duckworth, who lived in nearby Sherman, Texas. Some of them had sheets washed, assisted in the recreation events, etc. The first camping session was July 7 – August 22, 1974. It was held at the Methodist Church Camp at Lake Texoma, just outside of Pottsboro, Texas. Later, we had a formal meeting with District 2-E2 representatives that included John Hall, PDG Earl Duckworth, PDG Albert Brown, PDG Bill Hudson and others to formalize the relationship and ask them to join in our efforts at the Camp. This resulted in the Camp being sponsored by both Districts in subsequent years.

Years 1973 through 1975, the President was Surry Shaffer, Jr. (Founder of the Julien C. Hyer Lions Youth Camp). His officers were First Vice-President David Fagg, Second Vice-President

Albert Brown, Third Vice-President Odis Pharr, Secretary Hall Brown and Treasurer John Eads. All of these Lions were also the Directors in those years. Earl Duckworth became the second President in the year 1975-76. John Eads became the third President in the year 1976-77 and Jack Harris the forth President in 1977-78. Directors in 1975-1976 came from both Districts. They included Hall Brown, John Eads, Odis Pharr, Jim Bob Wilson from District 2-X1 and John Hall, Clifton Ramsey, Wayne Teague, Charles Wilson, John Deck, John Seelig and Bill Hudson from District 2-E2.

A formal dedication of the Julien C. Hyer Lions Youth Camp was held at the first camping session in July 1974 at the Methodist Camp site. Surry Shaffer, Jr. presided. Lunch was served by the Campers. Present also were PID (1971-73 Colorado) Phil Sterker, ID Bill Chandler (Alabama District 34) and ID Don Buckalew (Texas MD-2). Our special guest was Mrs. Hal B. Wallis (Martha Hyer), daughter of Judge Hyer. She accepted the dedication proclamation in the name of her father. Also present were State Youth Exchange Chairmen James Johnson (MD-2), Vernon Beebe (MD-3) and Hobert Large, (District 40). Heinz Frohnmayer, Youth Director, was also present.

The host Districts for the first camping session were District 2-X1, Governor Sylvan Moritz and District 2-E2, Governor John Seelig. Countries represented were Austria, Belgium, Canada, Finland, France, Germany, India, Italy, Ivory Coast, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, The Netherlands, Sweden, and the U.S.A. states of Colorado, Alabama, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. There were 34 youth involved in the first camping session.

The Camp offers a camping experience for boy and girl youths between 17 and 21 years of age. The purpose of the Camp is to recognize the Youths of Today as Leaders and Lions of Tomorrow. Youths will come together from all parts of the world under the banners of Lionism in the spirit of friendship, having an opportunity to develop a better understanding of people and their national differences by actual camping and traveling experiences. After a beginning camp week at Methodist Camp, the first few years involved supervised tours that took place for approximately three weeks duration with youths being hosted in homes of Lions and their families across Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and Oklahoma. Tours were later confined to Texas. After the tours, the youths were hosted in the homes of Lions and families in the respective host Districts. It was the hope of the Camp that the spirit of Lionism would be radiated all the way as youths experienced and observed differences in American home life.

The Camp continues today some forty-one years later after having served approximately 1,500 youth from around the world. Hopefully, through the extension of Lionism and this camping experience, we have made our World a better place. Our youth are our future.

Stories from the past...a Lion's Lion By PCC John Eads, Volume I, No. 1

When I think of one of the Lions I have had the privilege of serving with that I hold in high regard and know first-hand of his dedication to his country and to his fellow man, I think of PDG Surry Shaffer. I know many of you have experienced the gregarious nature of Surry or had unusual experiences in dealing with him in Lionism over the years. But Surry is Surry, and he was somewhat hyper (most of the time) or maybe I should say over enthusiastic. But it was his passion about being a Lion that drove him, along with his love for life and his insatiable desire to help people, especially youth. He spent many years doing so and enjoyed every moment of it. He still is an active Lion when he is able. I don't think he ever met a stranger. I might add, and I have personally experienced these attributes throughout our lifetime friendship, that Surry, as a man, a Mason and a Lion, has integrity and honesty above reproach.

Some things you may not know personally about this Lion. Whether you knew it or not, he fought for your freedom when most of you were young or maybe not even born yet. He was young then, about 19 years of age, in the United States 7th Army, 45th Infantry Division and fought in WWII, more specifically, in the, one of the fiercest battles in the war against the Germans at Alsace-Lorraine in the Moselle Valley. They fought against two SS Divisions. He was a BAR operator. (Life expectancy for a BAR operator was 8 minutes once the weapon was fired due to the flash out of the muzzle. Surry almost froze to death in that battle in -32-degree weather and was thankful that one of his buddies Shriver (later they found each other in Plano) rescued him before he succumbed to the cold. He was one of three survivors with Shriver. He was shot in the chest. He now suffers greatly from bad circulation in his legs from frost bite, breathing, dying nerves and is wheelchair bound most of the time. His body may be down, but his spirit is very much alive. His is still a Lion's Lion. Many of you may not know that he is the honored recipient of Purple Heart, the Bronze Star, the Combat Infantry Badge and many other recognitions. Surprising thing...he never talked about this much.

Please see the attached picture of his recent trip on the Honor Flight for World War II veterans to see the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C... He said it was almost the longest day of his life, except for possibly the days in combat I surmised, and one of the most memorable ones in a good while, when I talked to him recently by telephone. He now lives in Hot Springs, Arkansas with his lovely wife Dori in an assisted living facility.

Surry did some significant things in District 2-X1 while serving as a Lion. I am not talking about his being District Governor in 1976-77. I am talking about what he did in Lionism for the youth. He told me the reason he was so involved with the youth in Lionism was due to his being rescued at age 19. He was very instrumental in Texas and throughout the world of Lionism in developing Youth Exchange.

As a result of being Youth Exchange Chairman in various capacities for the District, MD-2 Texas and Internationally, he put Youth Exchange on the map internationally. He made many contacts with Lions from all over the world and many youth. I can remember the 68th International Convention held in Dallas where he got the University Park police department to block off two blocks that included his home on Bryn Marr for an international party. He talked all of his neighbors into helping him and Dori to host many International Lion dignitaries and those whom he had touched in some way through Youth Exchange. What a two-block party!! Joanna and I were fortunate enough to have attended and we were amazed at the mass of people from all over the world and the super hospitality of all the neighbors. Everyone would start at Surry and Dori's home and then go to each neighbor's home to be welcomed, fed and nourished with some kind of drink.

But that is not all. Since Surry had all these international Lion contacts, including Past Presidents of Lions Clubs International, he decided it was time for the youth to have a camping experience and be blended into and educated about our culture and in turn, the visiting youth would exchange and present part of their culture. After several years and some knock-down-drag-out conversations with International Past President Judge Julien C. Hyer, Surry founded the Julien C. Hyer Lions Youth Camp in 1973. He said he hood-winked the Judge into naming the Camp after him as I recall. The Camp was formed in 1973-74 with Surry as the first President. PDG Hall Brown and I were two of the first five Founding Directors. Hall served as Secretary, and I served as Treasurer. The dedication ceremony of the Camp was held at the Methodist Youth Camp in Pottsboro, Texas with the guest speaker being Judge Hyer's daughter, Martha Hyer, the Actress. The first Camp was held there also. We enlisted the help of the Sherman and Dennison Lions Clubs to help us at the Camp. As a result, PDG Earl Duckworth of 2-E2 became the second President and yours truly was honored to be the third President of the Camp. The Camp is in session today, as this story is being written. But there is more on this subject later in another "stories from the past" article.

Among other things, Surry, while Governor, started Gavel Travel, which is still being continued today through Club visitation to other Clubs.

Surry, thanks for your friendship and the many good times we have had serving together as Lions. If I did not get the story exactly right, remember, it is your fault. Most of all, *thank you, Surry, from all of us Lions for your sacrifice and service to us all!*
