Greetings, fellow Lions!

As in the past month, I am excited to share our District's progress for the first quarter (July – September) of Lion Year 2023-2024. I am incredibly happy with the progress and would like to congratulate you all for the job well done. Here are some of the key achievements:

Membership: Our District has chartered three new clubs with 68 Chartered Members so far. We added 128 net new members (added 179 and dropped 51) in the first quarter.

Service: Currently 50 out of 63 clubs are reporting in the Lions Portal; overall 80% of clubs reporting in the first three months is an exceptionally good percentage. Zone Chairs, please follow up with the clubs, if any of your clubs have not reported any service activities/meetings. So far, our District is doing well in other areas of service goals.

Training: So far 88 percent of the Zone Chairs and 54 percent of the Club Officers in our District have been trained. We still have plans to do more training sessions this year. I am happy with our achievements, and I would like to extend my sincere thanks to GLT Chair IPDG Fred Conger and his team for conducting several training sessions in the past couple of months.

Donation: The District has appealed to all the Clubs and Individual Lions to donate to LCIF by visiting the LCIF donation link: https://www.lionsclubs.org/en/donate. I, personally and on behalf of the District, request all Clubs and Individual Lions to donate any amount of your choice by visiting the LCIF donation link noted above. Please note that your donation may be counted for the Malvin Jones Fellowship award. So far 19 Clubs and 24 Lions from our District have donated to the LCIF, and I am sure this number will go up in the coming months.

Based on the first quarter's progress status, I am confident that our District will achieve all the District Goals of the year 2023-2024 by June 2023. The credit for this success will go to all the District 2-X1 Lions and Lions Clubs. Please keep doing all

A great Teamwork! Thank you PCC John Eads, IPDG Fred Conger and PDG Esmeralda Rodriguez for supporting me on club visits!

Some of our Zone Chairs have successfully completed their zone meetings and I am very satisfied with the Zone Chairs' reports, which are posted on the District 2-X1 website (home page tab). Some Zones will be conducting their first zone Meetings in October. 2-X1 goals for this year, is to recruit 330 new members with the drops limited to 280 for a net membership increase of 50. In three months we have surpassed that goal with +129. Let us keep the positive momentum going. The key to growth is member retention and 2-X1 has maintained a modest attrition of members. The chart shows 2-X1 goals vs actual. We have

done extremely well in new clubs and member recruitment.

GMA focus this year will be on clubs, so they will embrace the GMA process. The 4 step process is simple. I have developed a one page form that can be used to do the process, which should not take more than 1-2 hours. It has been passed to zone chairs, so they can disseminate these to club presidents. Please use this useful tool to better understand your club and how to recruit and retain new members. This will serve as a road map for the club. I will be happy to visit your club or zone meeting and go over in detail. Mission 1.5 is in full swing as the challenge has been accepted by most districts. Let us do our part by chartering new clubs and bring in new members towards achieving that goal.



Service: In the first quarter 102,486 people have been served in 712 service activities with 21,308 volunteer hours. Over 70% of the clubs have reported their activities on MyLion. LCl goal is to serve over a Billion people and every service activity needs to be counted to help achieve that goal.

Leadership Training: Club officers training was already held in June, including Zone Chairs and LCIF. Over 80% zone chairs have attended the training. In addition, training is offered for Club President, Secretary and Treasurer. Approximately 50% of club officers have been trained. A trained Lion makes a better Lion.

LCIF Contributions: District 2-X1 has collected \$6,011 towards our foundation during the three months . Please donate generously so the foundation can help more people around the world.

GMA Round Table is held on last Tuesday of the month from 6-7 PM. The purpose of this is to educate and to make aware to the participants about the GMA process, have an open and engaging discussion and to get input from Lions across MD-2. Last Tuesday we had PID Jerome Thompson as our guest speaker. Next meeting will be on October 24 and 2IVP AP Singh will be our guest speaker (to be confirmed). Please mark your calendars and plan on attending.



To collect dues from members enough to cover all club expenses.


To conduct activities to advance the communities welfare.

- Ask someone. Ask One!
- 2. Bring a guest to meetings
- 3. Advertise in newspapers & cable TV
- 4. Have a clear club goal & a strategic plan
- 5. Letters or personal contact with local businesses
- 6. Contact with Chamber of Commerce
- Place customized bookmarks in library books
- 8. Have public meetings at malls, outdoors, etc.
- 9. Have a booth at malls, fairs, festivals etc.
- 10. Place pamphlets in doctors' offices, hospitals, cafeterias, libraries, etc.
- 11. Create videos of your events and promote your Club on YouTube

Membership Key Awards acknowledge the importance of effective recruitment in membership growth by recognizing the number of new members a Lion has sponsored.

Each of the 17 Membership Keys is designed to reflect the number of new members sponsored. Keys are automatically issued by International Headquarters, based on the Monthly Membership Report statistics submitted by club secretaries, with a sponsoring Lion appropriately credited after a new member has remained a Lion for a year and a day.

Eligibility

- 1. A new member must remain a Lion for a year and a day before the name may be used as credit toward a key, to be issued the 13th month; except where the sponsored member dies, transfers or moves from the community before the expiration of a year and a day.
- 2. The name of the new member, with the sponsor's name, member number, and club number, must be reported on the club's Monthly Membership Report. (For existing clubs only.)
- Charter, transfer, and reinstated members cannot be used as credit for a key.
- Only one sponsor per new member can receive credit for a key.
- 5. No sponsor shall receive more than one key of the same type.

Each Key is a lapel pin with a clutch backing. For the Senior Master (recognizing 25 members) and above, the lapel pins are complemented by a distinctive medallion and presentation ribbon.

3 Tips to Improve Family and Volunteer Life


The dream of efficiently taking care of family and volunteering has often been challenging for many women. Volunteers' participation is highly influenced by the equilibrium in family and work life. Here are 3 areas that I focus on to help me maximize this balance.

First, plan in advance. One example is using a daily planner to write down

your important tasks that you want to accomplish. Weekends are good days to plan for weekly activities. Use all your resources (family and friends) to get as much help as you can. Allocate time for self care, cooking, cleaning, laundering, work assignments, and community projects. What helps the most is lining up projects by the deadlines and dedicating un-interrupted 1-2 hours early on a daily basis. Strict time management, not procrastinating, and consistent routine have provided plenty of extra time that I spend traveling with my loved ones and planning fun activities as a family to cherish memories of time well spent together! Second, invest in your health and wellbeing. Keeping your well visits and health screenings up to date are essential to keep up with the increasing demands of family, work and community. Use of down time during lunch breaks away from TV and social media to promote health by scheduling physical exams, mammograms, pap smears, colonoscopy, eye, and dental exams for the whole family. I have experienced many health benefits when I start my self-care routine upon awakening through 45-60 min of yoga and meditation, journaling, followed by sipping oat milk chai latte with my husband on the porch admiring the beauty of shrubs and flowers planted by us as a family!

Third, one must incorporate some form of physical activities to stay motivated mentally and physically. Most of my work related and volunteer meetings are conducted on the move during my walk time in nature. The use of airpods have been beneficial to provide a hands-free opportunity for planning upcoming projects. After 1-2 hours of daily productive walk, I return home feeling accomplished to check off my to-do checklist with a wide smile. I am able to focus and render boutique style individualized care at work and home with zero guilt. I highly encourage everyone not to undermine the benefits of spending your time walking, hiking, and cycling!

Good habits take time to sink in, once established they become the strong foundation for your journey to success. I emphasize starting small to stay motivated to achieve set goals in a timely fashion :-).
